The Coalition of Infant/Toddler Educators (CITE) is an all-volunteer, non-profit organization that was founded in 1985 to support the emerging need for professional development and support of infant/toddler teachers and administrators who provide infant/toddler programs. Our vision is that high quality early care and education is available to every infant and toddler in the state through a coordinated system of early childhood and family support programs that offer healthy, social/emotional learning environments and educated, responsive caregivers.

2012 was a very exciting year for CITE for several reasons: I) some half-dozen members (and one of CITE's advisory board members, Arlene Martin) were active participants in the development of the New Jersey Council for Young Children's New Jersey Birth to Three Early Learning Standards, the state's first guidelines for programs serving infants and toddlers and their families; 2) the number of those holding the New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential increased to 90 (we are excited that the 100th credential will be awarded in 2013!); and 3) board member participation on the New Jersey Council for Young Children's Infancy and Early Childhood Mental Health Committee (led by a CITE advisory board member, Gerry Costa).

2013 promises to be even busier for CITE! The publication of the New Jersey Birth to Three Early Learning Standards; the anticipated pilot of Grow NJ, the Quality Rating and Improvement System; and the expected introduction of infant mental health competency guidelines through the work of the New Jersey Council for Young Children's Infancy and Early Childhood Mental Health Committee will necessitate CITE's continuing involvement in this environment of expanding infant/toddler professional development demands as we seek to incorporate all of these advancements into the requirements of the New Jersey Infant/Toddler Credential.

CITE offers professional development through our annual conference by bringing together the best minds and talent in early care and education - with an emphasis on infant and toddler development and learning activities - from all over the country. Your attendance at the conference will give you the opportunity to learn from these experts and earn up to 12 hours of professional development. 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Friday Keynote Speaker - Gerard Costa, Ph.D. 8:30 am - 10:00 am



Dr. Costa was the founding director of the YCS Institute for Infant and Preschool Mental Health, a training and consultation, clinical service and research program concerned with the optimal development of infants and children, birth to six years, within the context of their relationships. In September 2011, he became the founding director of the newly established, Center for Autism and Early Childhood Mental Health in the College of Education and Human Services at Montclair State University. The new Center is dedicated to clinical services and professional development in the areas of autism and infant/child/parent mental health. Among the services planned are a community clinic for infants, children and families, two professional certificate programs, training and consultation services for infant, child and school-based programs and a professional training program for clergy in infant/child and family development.

Dr. Costa is a Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ) – New Jersey Medical School and as a member of Board of Directors, DIR and Graduate School faculty of ICDL (Interdisciplinary Council on Developmental and Learning Disorders). He serves as a consultant to ZERO TO THREE, and was involved in projects in Early Head Start, responses to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita and now serves on military projects with ZTT. He currently serves on several non-profit Boards including the New Jersey Child Assault Prevention Advisory Board and the Gateway-Northwest Maternal Child Health Consortium, and serves on the BUILD NJ Committee, addressing public-private initiatives for early learning, birth to five years of age.

Dr. Costa received his Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology from Temple University and as head of the YCS Institute, he led a 4-year Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health systems development project in partnership with Child Development Services of Wyoming and the Wyoming Developmental Disabilities Division. He is a former Head Start Director and has worked in early intervention programs since 1984. In October 2007, Dr. Costa was awarded the *Christian Kjeldsen Champion for Children Award* by the *Child Care Advisory Council of the Department of Human Services* of the State of New Jersey. In January, 2010, Governor Jon Corzine appointed Dr. Costa as one of 25 representatives and experts to the newly established New Jersey Council for Young Children, an early learning council addressing birth to 5 year olds, federally mandated for all 50 states. In June 2010, the *Mental Health Association in New Jersey* awarded a *Golden Bell Leadership Award* to Dr. Costa for his vision in creating the YCS Institute for Infant and Preschool Mental Health. He is the author of articles and book chapters on autism and infant mental health and has presented throughout the United States.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

The Hand that Rocks the Cradle Rules the World: Linking Infant Mental Health to Global Peace

What are the human qualities that engender empathy, the capacity to see the diverse world through another's perspective, to develop the emotional capacities that underlie reflectivity, controlling of aggression, resolving conflicts peacefully, and that lead us to enter adulthood and aging with a sense of moral interdependence and wisdom? This presentation will attempt to link what we know about psychological and neurological development, to lead us to a better understanding of what infants and children need in the first years of life to set the foundations for peaceful lives, as individuals, families, groups and as a society.

Betty Ann Ablon has a Master's Degree from Columbia University in Social Work which has allowed her to pursue her life long passion – working with children and families. "How fortunate I am," she says, "to be teaching, training and writing about infants and toddlers at a time when we know more about their development than we have ever known before."

In the 1990s she accepted the position of Vice President of Core Knowledge and Technology in a multi-service child care program in Dallas called "The Child Care Group." That move changed the trajectory of her professional life and allowed her to discover the incredibly challenging and fulfilling work that now dominates her career.

"That position," she says, "brought me wonderful new learning opportunities, introducing me to the rich, remarkable new research concerning the emotional life of infants and

toddlers". It also fit perfectly with the Child Care Group's unique program called Relationship Centered Child Care. The exciting new discoveries in brain development, attachment and temperament fueled my appetite for new learning and also increased my desire to share that learning with the people who needed this new knowledge the most: child care caregivers, providers and teachers. Both the sharing of that information and how to share it became and still is, my true passion."

"This work I do has allowed me to deepen my understanding of the critical importance of relationship to all human beings. From birth, we are wired to connect". This desire to connect has been incorporated into all the work Ablon does as a teacher, trainer, supervisor and author.

It is an undisputed given that infants and toddlers learn only in the context of relationship. Ablon believes that for all of us, relationships are the conduit for learning.

"I am extremely grateful for the people who have been so much a part of my learning. These include my colleagues at the Texas Association for Infant Mental Health and the many caregivers and home visitors who have taught me so much at the trainings I have done both in Texas and in New York where I have been privileged to teach and to train at Bank Street's Infancy Institute."

Currently, Ablon is a published author, nationally recognized teacher/trainer and a reflective practice "supervisor" and practitioner. She is endorsed as an Infant Mental Health Mentor at level four, Texas Association for Infant Mental Health's highest level.

Take Care of Our Children and Their Families, Taking Care of Ourselves: What's the Connection?

We have also listed the competency level of each of the presentations. The NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Key Indicator of Quality for each workshop is listed after the workshop title and presenter.

• Level I

Individuals at this level are at the first step in the commitment to a career in early care and education; they contribute to and assure the maintenance of a safe and nurturing environment in which young children learn and develop; they learn about children and families through participation in professional development activities; they receive ongoing supervision from someone at a higher level.

• Level II

Individuals at this level consistently exhibit practices grounded in theories of growth, development, and learning; they work cooperatively with others, establish good mentoring relationships, and sometimes provide direct supervision; they have participated in formal study leading to a degree and/or certificate and have refined their knowledge through guided and reflective experiences with young children and families.

• Level III

Individuals at this level have extensive academic preparation and experience in the field; they can be responsible for mentoring those at Level I and II; they possess the ability to provide new resources in the development of theory and innovative practice; they demonstrate a mastery of developmentally appropriate practices which allow them to mentor peers as well as persons at other levels.

She is a new and effective approach to engaging parents in important but sometimes difficult discussions.


