Friday Keynote Speaker - Michael Robb 8:30 am - 10:00 am



Michael Robb is Director of Education and Research at the Fred Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media at Saint Vincent College. He leads the development, content, and partnerships for the Fred Rogers Center Early Learning Environment[™], a website that curates high-quality digital resources in early literacy and digital media literacy for families and educators of children birth to age 5. He has published research and analysis on the impact of digital

media on young children's language development, early literacy outcomes, and problem solving in Child Development, Infant and Child Development, and the British Journal of Developmental Psychology. Dr. Robb holds a Ph.D. in Psychology from the University of California, Riverside.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

Show Me: Exemplary Uses of Technology in Early Childhood Education

This presentation will focus on the key skills and knowledge that educators need to have in order to use technology in effective, developmentally appropriate, and intentional ways. Michael Robb will explore what it takes to make educators good technology implementers, with the knowledge, skills, and digital literacy needed to select, use, integrate and evaluate technology tools and interactive media in classrooms and in homes with young children. Special consideration will be given to the developmental needs of infants and toddlers, and how technology fits into programs serving children under two. Participants will learn about the National Association for the Education of Young Children-Fred Rogers Center position statement on technology and interactive media, view and discuss videos of best practices, and explore new resources that educators can use in their work.

Saturday Keynote Speaker - Tamar Jacobson 8:30 am - 10:00 am



Tamar Jacobson was born in Rhodesia, now Zimbabwe, and traveled to Israel where she became a preschool teacher with the Israeli Ministry of Education. Dr. Jacobson completed a BA, masters, and doctorate in early childhood education at the University at Buffalo (UB). As Director of the University at Buffalo Child Care Center (UBCCC), she created a training site for early childhood students from area colleges including UB. Currently, Dr. Jacobson is Professor, Chair of the Department of Teacher Education, and Director of the early childhood program at Rider University, New Jersey. She was Recipient of the 2013 National

Association for Early Childhood Teacher Educators (NAECTE) Outstanding Early Childhood Teacher Educator Award, participated on the Consulting Editors Panel for NAEYC, and is a former Fellow in the Child Trauma Academy. Tamar Jacobson presents at International, National, State and Regional levels. She is author of: *Confronting Our Discomfort: Clearing the Way For Anti-Bias* (Heinemann, 2003), *Don't Get So Upset! Help Young Children Manage Their Feelings By Understanding Your Own* (Redleaf Press, 2008), and edited: *Perspectives on Gender in Early Childhood* (Redleaf Press, 2010), a collection of academic essays from a diverse group of scholars from around the United States and Europe.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS:

When Teachers Face Themselves: Learning What Makes Us Tick Emotionally When We Discipline Young Children.

Traditionally, early childhood teachers are taught strategies as some type of tools or a "quick fix" to control children's behaviors. Together, we understand how we filter our understanding of discipline through emotional memory of punishment - how we perceive children's behaviors in connection with how we remember being treated as young children. Self-reflection about what makes us adults tick emotionally is critical in helping children manage their own feelings. Let's challenge ourselves to reflect on our own emotional histories and find strategies for responding to children in ways that support their emotional health and development.

We have also listed the competency level of each of the presentations. The NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Key Indicator of Quality for each workshop is listed after the workshop title and presenter.

• Level I

Individuals at this level are at the first step in the commitment to a career in early care and education; they contribute to and assure the maintenance of a safe and nurturing environment in which young children learn and develop; they learn about children and families through participation in professional development activities; they receive ongoing supervision from someone at a higher level.

• Level II

Individuals at this level consistently exhibit practices grounded in theories of growth, development, and learning; they work cooperatively with others, establish good mentoring relationships, and sometimes provide direct supervision; they have participated in formal study leading to a degree and/or certificate and have refined their knowledge through guided and reflective experiences with young children and families.

• Level III

Individuals at this level have extensive academic preparation and experience in the field; they can be responsible for mentoring those at Level I and II; they possess the ability to provide new resources in the development of theory and innovative practice; they demonstrate a mastery of developmentally appropriate practices which allow them to mentor peers as well as persons at other levels.

Inspire your staff to use the NJ Birth to Three Early Learning Standards established for infants and toddlers, by learning simple ways to arrange your care environment to meet the changing engagement needs of the babies in your care. Then, team with other participants to explore using a NJ First Steps Birth to Three Early Learning Standards practice scheduling with a whiteboard tool designed to help you plan for each child daily. Participants will each receive a copy of the Standards.

3. Enhancing the First Relationship: Breastfeeding as a Protective Factor in Infant Mental Health – Jill K. Wodnick, Breastfeeding Educator, Lamaze Educator, Doula (Level II, III) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Nutrition* • *Infant Mental Health: Social/Emotional Well Being*

Breastfeeding initiation and retention is at the cross section of biological nurturing, children's health outcomes and reducing perinatal disparities. What role can childcare providers play in optimal infant nutrition? See toolkits from other states and learn more about breastfeeding as a protective factor in infant mental health, not just physical nutrition.



1. Just Say No! Toddlers: Terrible Two's Or Freedom Fighters - Tamar Jacobson, Ph.D., Professor, Rider University, Chair, Department of Teacher Education, Director of the Early Childhood Program (Level I, II)

NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – Child Development

The way that adults respond to children's behaviors is determined by their early childhood experiences and knowledge of child development. Children's behavior is unique to their personality and family structure. Is there time to stop and think, or confront our comfort level with different behaviors before we respond? We will discuss the difference between discipline and punishment, clarification of boundaries, and education for responsibility.

2. Using Music, Books & Puppets to Enhance Learning Skills - Maryann "Mar" Harman, Early Childhood Consultant (Level I, II) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Curriculum*

As we draw more senses to the learning experience, children retain more. Participants will be shown how to enhance learning by combining music and movement with puppets for visual, aural and tactile stimulation. The importance of using props with music and movement will be discussed and validated. How to physically involve our youngest children in playful stories will be a focal point and demonstrated. How the brain works during these activities will also be examined and demonstrated.

3. Tai Chi for Toddlers – Miriam Moran Shankman, Early Childhood Movement and Tai Chi, Qigong and Meditation Teacher (Level I, II, III) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Health and Safety*

Come ready to move and have some fun. Tai chi is healthy. It can also be totally emerging from your curriculum, and blending with your daily activities. No prior experience needed. You will take with you activities for the classroom.

4. What's Your Plan? Writing Lesson Plans for Infants and Toddlers – Angie DeFazio, Early Childhood Education Consultant/Trainer, Infant/Toddler Specialist, Is It Good For Children, LLC (Level I, II, III) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Curriculum*

Participants will learn how to use the NJ Birth to Three Early Learning Standards and NJ Child Care Licensing requirements to design lesson plans and document observations once the lessons have been implemented. Grow NJ Kids requirements for documented lesson plans will also be discussed. Please bring a copy of the NJ Birth to Three Early Learning Standards with you, if you have them.

5. Meaningful Investigations with Toddlers – Carolyn E. Tebbetts, Teacher, Ben Samuels Children's Center at Montclair State University (Level I, II) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Curriculum*

What do toddlers find interesting? Teachers and assistants can explore using observation, implementation, reflection and documentation to create meaningful, emergent curriculum investigations with toddlers. How to begin the process and follow it through.

6. Brain Development in Infants and Toddlers – Dr. S. Virginia Gonsalves-Domond, Professor of Psychology, Ramapo College of NJ (Level I) NJ Infant/Toddler Credential Quality Key Indicator – *Child Development*


